2022 Accomplishments

- 2M+ Billboard Impressions (Fentanyl and Naloxone)
- 9,458 Primary prevention materials distributed
- 6,500 Pounds of food distributed through the food pantry
- 1,800 Pounds of fresh vegetables distributed to families and schools
- 2,300 Boxes of Narcan distributed in our communities
- 1,438 Youth engaged in primary prevention community education trainings
- 1,076 Middle school students and parents engaged in programming
- 773 Students with improved school performance
- 735 Adults engaged in primary prevention community education trainings
- 414 Students engaged in 5 weeks of AZ OnTrack Summer Camp
- 125 Individuals served through the Clothes Closet
- 97 Youth engaged in the Casa Grande Youth Alliance
- 52 Families engaged in Parenting Workshops (Strengthening Families, Triple P)
- 12 New youth and family afterschool programs developed and implemented



 <u>Framework</u> as a model for engagement, and establish a visible, recognized "place to go" for issues and concerns to youth.
- Support better communication and cooperation among youth in our community.
- Establish meaningful opportunities for youth to be involved in community service, advocacy, and personal enrichment.
- Provide a context in which meaningful youth-adult partnerships can flourish and youth learn and exercise responsibility and leadership.
- Spread knowledge of quality youth engagement strategies and Alliance's activities.

CASA GRANDE — Members of a local student advocacy group gave a presentation to the Casa Grande Union High School District Governing Board Tuesday about youth wellness.

Casa Grande Alliance Executive
Director Bob Shogren told the board
about a survey conducted with the
affiliated group Casa Grande Youth
Alliance. He said he wanted his
organization to understand the impact
of COVID-19 on school life.

"A year ago when everybody returned to school we were meeting with kids and everybody kind of thought about how do kids deal with school being online and what has the experience been like," Shogren said. "And about 1,500 high school youth completed the survey.















































FUTURE PROJECTS

University of Baltimore – (\$150,000 – 1 year of funding)

Combating Overdose Through Community-Level Intervention (COCLI)

Safe Supportive Schools Expansion – Expand the work of the Safe Supportive Schools Initiative started at Cholla Elementary and Cactus Middle to six additional schools; expand Thrive – Resilience Program for Teens to grades 6 and 7; primary prevention

One Arizona Opioid Settlement Funds - (\$750,000 - 3-year project)

Youth Resiliency Project – In partnership with Casa Grande School Districts develop a SAMHSA approved Peer Support model program, training and engaging high school aged peer support specialists to serve high needs middle school youth.

Saint Mary's Food Bank Distribution Point

Under consideration to become a distribution point for Saint Mary's Food Bank to serve 100 families a month.

Before and Afterschool Programs for School Aged Children

ADHS Licensed and AZDES Tuition Reimbursement Supported Childcare for school-aged children based on assessed needs of families.

AmeriCorps VISTA Intermediary project for Casa Grande and Pinal County (2023-2027)

We will be working to develop a needs-based intermediary VISTA project to expand a focus on the family engagement project concept.
