Most Common ACES of our Youth





Substance abuse by a household member: 64%

Incarceration of a household member: 50%

Emotional abuse: 43%

Physical abuse: 26%

Sexual abuse: 14%

Compares baseline data from youth to their current status.





Asks about risk, protective factors, and their relationship with their mentor.

Who Took the Survey?



Relationship with Mentor – Youth Quotes

"My mentor **cares** about me and always makes me feel **seen** and has great **advice** and **ideas** to move me forward and she's so **fun** and **interesting** to hang out with always."

"I feel that my mentor **cares** about me and I think they are someone that I could **go to with my problems**"

My mentor has helped me in ways I wouldn't ever think I would be helped. She didn't **only make my life better**, but **she made me better** and I appreciate every second I get to spend time with her"

"He is **open** about anything I want to discuss, he doesn't shy away from it."

Relationship with Mentor



82% Rated their relationship with their mentor as a 5+ (out of 6).

My mentor asks for my opinion: 95%





My mentor understands me: 93%

My mentor thinks of fun and interesting things to do: 91%





When I'm with my mentor I feel safe in sharing any emotion: 90%


Risk Factors Decreasing

We served more than **500** youth in FY23, with 306 matched with a mentor, and we are on track to enroll 100 more youth every year.



We have served more than **7,000** youth since our founding in 1989.



We estimate there are **180,000** youth in our community who would fit the eligibility requirements of our program.
